BEST PRACTICE-I

Title of the Practice:

Integrated Skill Development Platform

Goal

The college offers courses in the streams of Arts, Science, Commerce and Professional categories. Despite of certain specific goals of syllabus and curriculum, the courses in each of these streams have certain common objectives to pursue and achieve. This entails the departments to organize their activities in coordination with others. It is equally important to direct the flow of financial assistance in such a manner as to fulfill the common objectives. In order to avoid duplication of programs, to effectively engage the available human resource and to maintain the financial discipline, the college brought the activities performed by the various departments under the associations exclusively catering to the requirements of each of the streams.

The Context

The challenges of employment sector necessitates the institution to nurture, develop and evolve the learners by organizing Co-curricular activities which help in the development of mind and personality and plays a vital role in shaping their life. These activities also enable to supplement and complement the curriculum and are an extension of the formal learning experience in an academic programme. Imparting of skills such as, problem-solving, team building, organization, decision making, planning and execution, time management and leadership skills, communication, interpersonal skills and personality development to make the students globally competitive.

The college primarily caters to the need of neighboring population of partition settlers, marginalised sections and economically weaker sections. The number of students enrolled in various courses is higher than other institutions. In order to work towards an overall development of the students with such vulnerable backgrounds, the college strives to conduct various activities. The courses and programs offered by the college are highly in demand as well as high in number. Separate organization of various co-curricular activities requires that funds, manpower, and logistical support would be demanded by the departments for each activity which may have similar aims and objectives. Therefore bringing all the activities of similar in nature under the associations with similar objectives was needed.

The Practice

- The major goals before the Indian Higher Education are equity, access, quality and expansion. The institutions of higher learning strive to achieve those within the tangible constraints of finance and other resources. Proper direction of available resources should be the priority of the institution in order to cater the requirements of mass education.
- Every year the college forms three associations, namely Arts Forum, Commerce Association and Science Association, respectively to organise the various activities for students of Arts, Commerce and Science faculties respectively.
- Each student offers their financial contribution towards the association at the time of the admission. The fund is managed by the college under separate accounting heads, exclusively available to be utilised by the Association for organisation of various activities. On certain occasions the Association may provide the financial assistance to the programmes which are jointly organised by the Association with any other Department or Association.
- The executive committee of the Association is comprised of the Chairperson, Treasure and Committee Members, from among the teachers from the departments falling under the category of the respective Association. The Principal announces the composition of committee before the end of previous academic year. The prior constitution of committee ensures sufficient time to the committee to prepare the activity plan for the coming academic year.
- At the beginning of the academic year the committee begins its activities with the inauguration ceremony and at the end of the academic year it closes its activities with valedictory. Persons of eminent repute from the respective fields are invited to grace the occasion and deliver a speech.
- The Associations organise various extracurricular activities in order to develop debating skills of the students, the ability of decision making, the sense of belongingness, the habits of constructive competition, and the sense of belongingness.
- These activities create avenues to meet with various people thereby helps in socialization, self-identification and self-assessment.
- Under the Integrated Skill Development Platform the college conducts several inter and intra collegiate programs such as Dhruv, Srujan- an intercollegiate science exhibition programme , Lakshya- an intercollegiate event involving quiz, debate, poster, storytelling and gaming competition , Parlance- an event aimed to imbibe managerial skills among the students, Patheya- publication of Marathi articles and poems by the students , Avesh-

intercollegiate science and environment based skit competition and Bhatt memorial week-organised by Microbiology students involving skit, debate, poster competition.

Evidence of Success

Formation of Platform for integration of various activities of the departments under common roof resulted into following benefits.

- ▶ Streamlining of the decision making process in terms of command and supervisory role for the IQAC to play key role in providing necessary guidance and assistance.
- ▶ Financial discipline achieved by considerable reduction in the cost incurred on various programmes having repetitive character.
- ▶ Brought sense of responsibility and feeling of participation among the students who finance, coordinate and organise activities meant for them.
- ▶ Proper utilisation of human resource in the form of teaching and non-teaching staff became possible, resulting into redirecting it to other activities of teaching-learning, research and administration.
- ▶ Duplication and repetition of activities reduced to considerable extent.
- ▶ Students are given common platform to develop soft skills and engage with students of other colleges in meaning full way to imbibe the necessary social skills.

BEST PRACTICE-II

Title : Parampara of cultural expressions:

Goal:

There is an increasing pressure in the higher education system to equip students with transferable skills to enable them to play effective role in the employment sectors. The current scenario has several job opportunities in fields of visual media and performing arts. Thus the College recognizes the need to provide different skill sets to learners with different aspirations and professional orientations. The Parampara program is an application-oriented and skill-based program which identifies students and provides a Teaching – Learning and skill development module for learners oriented towards a career in performing Arts.

Parampara encourages the development of leadership, communication skills, activities in learning, and foster growth in human excellence and promotes formation of faith and values along with the transmission of knowledge and skill as integral dimensions of the learning process.

Context:

The field of education is currently undergoing a paradigm shift with the onus now being on the learner, which means students have to be motivated for taking initiative with the stimulated environment created by the curriculum and the way it is transacted and the academic ambience provided to them. Value addition is crucial to enhance employability because the global employment market today requires in prospective employees complex and varied skills and competencies.

The academic curriculum does not provide the flexibility required for development of such programs and, there is no provision for appointment of regular full- time trainers for imparting such skills. The Parampara program was initiated with the aim of imparting skills in performing arts, through a process of mentoring by Alumni and senior students, who are part of the Industry. The institution displays sensitivity to changing educational, social and market demands and is geared to promote an ambience of creativity and innovation. The institution thus strives to promote value-based education and social responsibilities.

Practice:

A cultural endeavour has to be purposeful and must lead to the ultimate goals and aspirations of the graduates with lots of aspirations for building a career for them to be financially independent and professionally competent.

The higher education institution caters to pursue the all round development of students to the full measure of their talents. To develop focused and in-depth skills and develop commitment to excellence through continuous reflection.

To enable students explore reality with open hearts and minds and inculcate the right values among them to form men and women of competence, conscience and compassionate commitment. The students should be motivated to inculcate the culture of self-discipline, and integrity.

The college has a well-established network of alumni who have excelled in their field of Performing Arts. The Alumni and senior students mentor the young learners through regular workshops and training sessions. Members of the cultural committee of the college function as facilitators for the entire program. Workshops are held for the following

Marathi and Hindi Literature: Reading and analyzing of great works of literature. Discussion sessions, where the language, social context, characters are analyzed and debated upon.

Training in Voice modulation and Dialogue delivery: Practical training sessions are conducted for voice modulation and effective dialogue delivery.

Scripting: Learners are encouraged to develop scripts for short skits of 5 minute duration. The ideas for the script are then developed into full length skits and performed during University Youth Festivals.

Direction: Different genres of theatre and direction styles are studied.

Set designing and Costumes: Learners are trained in the art of set – designing. All the Sets used for various shows are indigenously designed and prepared on the campus.

Make –up: Training sessions for make –up application.

Music and Sound Editing: Training sessions for recording and editing of music.

Music: Training in Non- Classical Sugam Sangeet, guitar and western – percussion instruments.

Public Speaking

The trained students are then directed for participation in various competitions in the university and other organizations .The students also participate and perform in our college during different events . The students are thus competent enough to face the challenges of the outside world in terms of internship and employment. The media boom has opened several employment avenues for learners inclined towards the performing arts - especially Theatre and Music. But there is need to impart specific skill sets in order to further hone the natural talent of the learners, to make them ready for the Entertainment Industry. Parampara acts as tools to develop models of collaborative, community or field-based activity to enable students to experience the learning in performing arts

Evidence of Success

The Parampara program has strengthened the cultural activities contingent of the college. Several learners and alumni, who are part of the program, are established names in the marathi theatre scene and also on television. Some of the current learners are practicing musicians and singers. One of our students, Mr. Abhijit Pawar is recipients of the Sanskruti Kala Darpan award. Mr. Abhijit Pawar, Ms. Purva Kaushik and Mr. Gaurav Malankar are popular names in marathi theatre and serials. The college has an excellent tradition of achievement in Cultural activities and many of the award winning performances in the field of theatre and Music have been choreographed / Directed by the alumni of the program. Students have received awards in youth festivals and the alumni are recognized faces on the television. The students have received fourteen awards at state level and one award at national level .The students have participated in song, skit, group songs, and instrumental music for the competitions. Thus the college has emerged as an institution of choice for learners aspiring for a career in theatre and performing arts.

- Resources required are room dedicated for rehearsals, Musical instruments , Reference material / Books , CDs , Computer with software for recording and sound editing , Sound system .
- Workshops for continuous up gradation and improvement for students.
- A separate financial head for the training programmes.
- Mobilizing professional help for placement of students.
- Adequate infrastructure support
- Concerted effort from the drivers of quality is essential for the effectiveness of the programme.
- The semester system leads to time restraints for students to participate in activities and competitions

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
